Park Board Statutory Compliance

Under Indiana Code 36-10-3, Park Boards have some basic requirements to meet under the law, which includes:

- · Staggered terms of service (member terms all expire on different years)
- \cdot No member of the local government fiscal body (council, Mayor, etc.) may serve on a Board
- · Under Town governments (unless waived by ordinance by the Town), no more than two members of any political party may serve on a board. Third Class Cities (>35,000 population) do not have this requirement. (Hebron is a Town)

FORWARD

The Hebron Park and Recreation Five (5) -Year Master Plan presented in this report is intended to provide a sound and workable plan to guide the acquisition of lands and the development of facilities to meet the outdoor recreation needs of town residents, with or without a disability, and to preserve wetlands, woodlands, stream corridors, and other natural resources within the town. Consistent implementation of this plan would, over time, provide an integrated system of park and recreation sites within the town that would preserve important natural resource areas and provide Hebron residents with opportunities to participate in a wide range of outdoor recreational activities. This plan is intended to provide a vision of the town's park and recreation system five (5) years or more into the future. It is also intended to serve as a guide to assist elected town officials and staff in making the day-to-day decisions needed to make that vision a reality. To assist in implementing the plan, both long-term recommendations for the next five years, and a shorter-term "action plan" are presented.

The Town of Hebron Park and Recreation Board (Park Board) has primary responsibility for implementation of this Five-Year Master Plan. Funding to implement the plan, however, is the prerogative of the Hebron Town Council. The plan presented in this report should not be considered a budget document or viewed as a commitment on the part of the Town of Hebron to provide funding for the recommended projects. Funding decisions are made as part of the annual town budget process, available funds, and consideration of a variety of other activities and projects competing for limited town financial resources.

The town of Hebron is anticipated to experience exponential housing growth in the next 10 years. Windy Hill and Park Ridge subdivisions are expected to create 850 new single-family homes. The estimated 2,300 plus residents, expect park and recreation opportunities to be available, for leisure time experiences.

DEFINITION OF PLANNING AREA

The planning and service area for the Town of Hebron Parks and Recreation is the town of Hebron corporate limits, plus a four-mile fringe area. The service area does not stop at the town limits but includes a fringe area of rural users approximately four miles from the town center.

The Town of Hebron Parks and Recreation is committed to sharing facilities and programs with town residents and rural users. The financial impact on the Town of Hebron Parks and Recreation on rural users has not been studied. That said, there currently are no offsets in place for rural users that are not part of the town tax base. The Town of Hebron Parks and Recreation welcomes users to enjoy the healthy opportunities the Town of Hebron Parks and Recreation facilities and programs has available!

Natural Features and Landscape

The landscape in the town of Hebron is mostly flat grassland, including hilly areas in the northwest section of the town, with mature Red and White Oaks, Red Maples and Tulip trees. The geology of the town of Hebron is moderate clay composition, deep and fertile A and B horizons. The soil in the town of Hebron varies from sandy clay loams in the hilly northwest, to silty clay loams in the bottoms near Cobb Creek. The topography of the town of Hebron is highest in the southwest quadrant gradually decreasing in elevation almost fifty (50) feet moving in a northern and eastern direction. Major storm water drainage ways, due to this topography, (Dog Lake and Henderson ditches) lie at the eastern and western edges of the Town of Hebron boundary. Cobb Creek travels north and south in the town and is located east of the Assembly Hall located at 611 N. Main Street. Cobb Creek enters the Kankakee River south of the town of Hebron. The Kankakee River is approximately one-half mile from the town limits.

IMPORTANCE of NATURAL FEATURES and LANDSCAPE

The natural features and landscape of the town of Hebron, described above, are valuable assets for the existing Hebron Parks and Recreation and for the future development of open spaces, public places, lands, and

structures within the town of Hebron. The soil in the town of Hebron does not limit construction or development, but care should be taken when planning construction or development in areas in or near Cobb Creek.

The flat grasslands support seven (7) neighborhood parks with play structures for children of all ages, a sports complex for organized basketball, tennis, pickleball and a one-mile multi-use trail. The flat grassland allows for easy maintenance such as mowing. From time-to-time town residents that live near certain parks have "spruced up" small, landscaped areas on their own which reflects the importance of the town's natural environment, allowing for fresh air, exercise and admiration of nature.

A few parks, mainly near the downtown area, have many large mature trees that provide shade in the summer. In 2022 and 2023, during severe weather conditions, high winds brought down several aged trees at Alyea Park and Cohen Park. One tree fell and damaged a power pole. The cost to remove the fallen trees (and replace the power pole) during this 2-year period was over \$8,700. Also, inspecting the parks for diseased or dead trees is part of the regular maintenance schedule to ensure the safety of park users and to prevent damaged property. The park's trees have not recently encountered Indiana's common tree diseases such as Armillaria root rot, cankers, Emerald Ash Borer infestations, and gypsy moth infestations. Moving forward, the town would like to plant additional trees, bushes and landscape bare areas where the budget allows. Outside funding options will be explored to maximize town funds such as matching grants and donations.

A community garden or milpa garden could provide a low-cost activity for the community and capitalize on earth's simple nature. During the recent community survey, 67% responded favorably for a garden to be established in town and has been added to the "Action Plan Schedule" (see page 20).

MAN-MADE FEATURES

Indiana State Road 2 (Main Street) serves the major north-south transportation route in the town of Hebron. The heart of the Hebron downtown business district is at the intersection of State Road 8 and U.S.

Highway 231/SR 2 (commonly known as Main Street). These federal and state highways have sidewalks available on both sides of the corridor and pedestrian crossings are on site. The remainder of the town of Hebron lacks a connected sidewalk system for the majority of the community including the schools, library, parks and business districts.

Although the downtown has gone through many changes over the years, it still retains a few late nineteenth and early twentieth century commercial structures. The town of Hebron has two Industrial Parks, commonly known as Costin (south) and Norbeh (east) Industrial Parks. The western area of town is zoned industrial and supports three (3) businesses. The Valparaiso Municipal Airport, twelve (12) miles northeast of the town of Hebron is the hub for private planes/pilots for local businesses and charter services. Passenger rail nor business rail services are available in the town of Hebron.

The town of Hebron is currently mostly residential homes with commercial buildings along Main Street. The four (4) mile fringe area outside of the town's geographic boundary is predominantly agricultural, with over 75% of the land used for cropland, pastureland, or forest land.

Overall, the town's park equipment is aged, weathered and needs updated.

IMPORTANCE of MAN-MADE FEATURES

The heavily traveled federal and state highways (SR 8, SR 2, US231) that travel through the town could potentially be perceived as barriers to access town parks. Although, this does not seem to deter visitors to our parks mainly because there are sidewalks that line the principal highway in town. Most notably, the Brookwood subdivision has sidewalks within the subdivision but does not have a park or safe bike/pedestrian pathway to visit the closest park or multi-use trail. Pedestrians and bicyclists must travel on a county road (CR 725S) 1½ miles to reach sidewalks on Main Street. A Brookwood resident mentioned this barrier in a recent community survey. Resolving barriers to park features is very important and the town is working to resolve such issues.

The Park Board has made strategic park equipment purchases and prioritized repairs within the last 5 years. Currently, the town does not

have impact fees or direct revenue funneled for park improvements. During the recent community survey, an overwhelming number of responses commented that the park equipment is outdated and/or in need of repair and would like to see additional amenities such as a dog park or central park (w/ splashpad) with an approximated cost of \$25,000 and \$500,000, respectively. It was also noted that only 50.39% responded they would be willing to donate or help assist with park improvements if a Parks Foundation or Community Foundation was established.

HISTORICAL and CULTURAL FEATURES

The Porter County Interim Survey of Historic Sites and Structures lists (3) "Outstanding" Historic Structures in the town of Hebron. These include the McCune Home (Stagecoach Inn), Hebron Carnegie Library and John Sigler House. Located at 127 North Main Street, the McCune Home was constructed by James McCune in 1849 and now serves as the Stagecoach Inn Historical Museum. The structure served as a tavern and inn for stagecoaches passing through the pioneering community, and later served in the same capacity when railroads were laid through the town in 1858 for travel between Detroit and St. Louis. The town also preserves its railroad history by caring for the Panhandle Railroad Depot, which is located behind the Stagecoach Inn Historical Museum.

Hebron was historically known for a resting place for sportsmen who came to hunt and fish along the Kankakee River which remains a local hunting and fishing area to this day.

IMPORTANCE of HISTORICAL and CULTURAL FEATURES

The historical and cultural features are the important building blocks of the Hebron community that exists today. The Stagecoach Inn Historical Museum and Panhandle Railroad Depot are extremely important to the history of the town. The Town of Hebron Parks and Recreation is charged with preserving and communicating this history to park users. Thus, the preservation of these historic structures and their history shape some of the activities of the Hebron Parks and Recreation.

The Hebron Historical Society has provided countless tours and stories to interested people about the history of Hebron. Along with stories and

artifacts from pioneering in the 1800's, they have discussed the use of the railroads in that era. Many visitors from across the United States have traveled to Hebron to visit our Stagecoach Museum and Panhandle Railroad Depot.

The July 4th celebration in the town of Hebron is an annual event that gathers the entire community together. The 4th celebration includes a parade, and a firework display sponsored by the Town of Hebron. Large crowds gather for the Annual Turtle Derby race and the local Veterans of Foreign Wars organization performs a fitting American Flag Raising ceremony accompanied by the Hebron School Band. These events connect the town residents and visitors to the history and culture of the community.

All the above-described historical and cultural features bring visitors to the town of Hebron and the town's parks, as well as shoppers to the local businesses. Holding such events provides the opportunity to showcase our community to non-residents searching for a home.

Hebron has partnered with regional agencies including the Veterans Parkway Commission, the Friends of the Veterans Parkway, and the Northwestern Indiana Regional Planning Commission to create an interconnected trail system that provides a range of recreational possibilities to enhance the community.

The Town of Hebron partners with the local Chamber of Commerce and local businesses for scavenger hunts, "Movies in the Park", and various holiday events to bring the community together. These partnerships reflect the community's "A Community Working Together" motto.

Social and Economic Status

When comparing the 2020 Census and the 2021 American Community Survey One (1) Year Estimate, the percentage of the community living at or below poverty level has moved downward to 10.4% from 15.5% five years ago, although the median household income increased from \$64,276 during the same time span. The unemployment rate in 2016 was 12.7% which was much higher than the current rate of 4.1%. These are important factors when decisions are made regarding fees for Park and Recreation sponsored events or activities. Most of the events and activities are free of charge affording all residents the opportunity to participate regardless of income. If a fee must be charged, the Park Board's policy is to keep the cost as low as economically feasible to make the activity affordable to as many people as possible. Volunteer support is paramount in the Park Board's cost containment strategies. As the median age jumped four (4) years since the last 5-year plan, it is expected to incorporate more youth, teen and adult-aged park activities and amenities as the town grows.

Options for funding existing and new facilities/equipment to modernize Hebron's parks include, but not limited to, creation of a Park Foundation, issuing bonds and enacting park impact fees and/or increasing the tax

rate. The social and economic factors of the community and the Town of Hebron suggest the ability to repay bonds, donate to a Park Foundation and allow for park impact fees and/or increasing the tax rates to support initiatives and fund the park department. Although, the option of offering a sliding scale based on income to users at some park-sponsored events will provide another outlet for funding.

The Town of Hebron is anticipated to experience exponential housing growth in the next 10 years. Windy Hill and Park Ridge subdivisions are expected to create 850 new large single-family homes. The estimated 2,300 plus residents, expect park and recreation opportunities to be available, for leisure time experiences. The developers are required to dedicate sidewalks, certain acreage and funding for a park in each subdivision as construction moves forward.

ANNUAL BUDGETS and EXPENDITURES

The Town of Hebron's property tax and local income tax revenues are the funding sources of the Park Department's budget.

The annual park budget for the last three years has generally remained unchanged. The three categories for the Hebron Parks and Recreation expenses are: Programming, Park Maintenance/Supplies and Park Equipment. The Hebron Park Board has successfully increased the number of park programs and replaced park equipment in recent years by making budget-friendly decisions. The Hebron Park Board partners with the Hebron Public Library, Hebron Chamber of Commerce, other regional agencies, and local businesses to successfully operate a number of park programs held each year.

Neighboring Community Recreation

The closest neighboring community is Boone Grove, Indiana which is six (6) miles northeast of Hebron. Boone Grove is an unincorporated rural community in Porter County. Most of the Boone Grove community attends Porter Township School System. Accessibility and Universal Design

The Town of Hebron will soon perform self-evaluation so that data can be documented concerning the ease of access and use of the Town of Hebron's facilities. This self-evaluation also includes various employment practices of the Town of Hebron. After the evaluation, the Town of Hebron will create a transition plan to ensure any changes are made to ensure people with disabilities have equal rights and choices as people without disabilities.

As of this writing, Novreske Park and the Veterans Memorial Trail have accessible routes from the entrances or outside bike/pedestrian access points to the park/trail, leading to accessible features inside those parks. The balance of the Hebron Parks does not have any accessible routes from the entrances or outside bike/pedestrian access points to the parks, leading to any accessible features inside those parks. As accessible park features/equipment is added to Hebron's parks, accessible routes will be constructed to facilitate the new amenities.

Public Participation

The Hebron Park Board held a Public Hearing on September 14, 2023, at 7PM Local Time (CDT) at the Community Center/Assembly Hall, 611 N. Main St., Hebron, Indiana.

The meeting was advertised by:

- Notification on 1,350 Hebron August utility bills as part of a direct mail outreach effort
- Newspaper legal notice
- Fliers in various locations in town
- · Town of Hebron official website
- Town of Hebron official Facebook page
- Hebron Park Board official Facebook page

The sign in sheet record shows 7 members of the public attended the public hearing. A short list of the comments and issues discussed by the public at the meeting include:

- Need for park restrooms
- Splashpad is #1 priority
- Location of Milpa Garden
- Location of Dog Park
- Excited for Trail extension

The Hebron Park Board selected a multiple-choice survey random public input method. An online survey using SurveyMonkey was used to capture the voices and opinions of Hebron residents. Special invitations were made to high school students to encourage their participation in the survey. Youth outreach efforts included a special streamlined survey for elementary school students. An additional 100 paper surveys were distributed at the Little League Field opening day on April 27, 2023. Surveys were accepted from April 1, 2023, through May 30, 2023. SurveyMonkey collected 169 general and 202 youth survey responses. 371 Hebron residents took the survey. The multiple-choice survey format was chosen for versatility, ease of use and gathering of clean data that is easy to analyze. This survey format provides a fixed list of answer options yielding structured survey responses and ease for respondents to complete in a limited amount of time. Please refer to Exhibit B, Pages 23-64 for a survey report summary and the comments gathered from the two (2) surveys using the multiple – choice survey random public input method.

- Youth programming for toddlers to teens
- · A community garden is a great idea
- Too many tiny parks, need large park with ball fields, tennis, basketball, soccer, pickle ball and pavilions.

NEEDS ANALYSIS

Town of Hebron total acres of local parks and recreation land: 18.82 Acres Town of Hebron total population by the most recent US Census: 3755

The Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP) is an information resource that quantifies and analyzes the state's (and county's) outdoor recreation resources for the social, environmental, health, and economic benefit of citizens statewide. According to the SCORP, Porter County is not considered a "critical county". Criteria for a "critical county" is a supply of outdoor-recreation acres of 55 acres per 1,000 population or greater or a population-growth rate higher than the 2014 to 2018 estimated Indiana statewide population growth rate of 1.44% (data obtained from the U.S. Census 2014 and 2018 population estimates). Alternatively, if the criteria included only the supply of local acres of outdoor-recreation land (at 20 acres/1,000 population), such as Hebron's 18.82 acres, Porter County would be considered a "critical county". Porter County lacks 398 acres of public outdoor recreation acres provided by local governments to meet the State of Indiana's Level of Service (LOS) guidelines.

The top five most common needs or desires expressed by the public during the public participation methods are:

- 2. Park restrooms
- 3. Walking /biking trails
- 4. Dog park
- 5. Camps for youth

The top five most common needs or desires as listed by the Town of Hebron Park Board are:

- 3. Cohen Park equipment upgrades
- 4. Dog park
- 5. Zipline

The Town of Hebron Park Board one large "dream" amenity or facility (regardless of cost) is to extend the Veterans Memorial Trial one mile in the next ten years.

PRIORITIES and ACTION PLAN SCHEDULE

Using both public input and the Park Board's top five lists of expressed parks and recreation needs, a single top 10 priority list of action items was created. Below is the list of priority actions with #1 being the highest priority, down to #10 being the lowest priority:

- 1. Splash pad
- 2. Upgrades to basketball courts across all parks with basketball courts
- 3. Dog park
- 4. Walking/biking trails





Q12 Do you see a need for additional pavilions to rent for events (birthdays, reunions, etc)?





Q16 Would you like to see a boat launch on the Kankakee River in the Hebron area?







Q18 Would you be interested in "Music in the Park" programs once a month on Sundays?







Q20 How would you rate your interest in a Milpa Garden?







Q1 Have you visited any park in the Town of Hebron this past summer?





Q2 Have you visited the Stagecoach and Railroad Museums in the Town of Hebron?





Q3 Did you think the Stagecoach and Railroad Museums in Town was interesting or fun?





Q4 Would you be interested in planting and harvesting a community garden?




